Dear Mr. LaDuke:

The New Albany Historic Preservation Commission (NAHPC) is a volunteer branch of the City government that works to preserve New Albany's rich, nationally recognized historic heritage. The NAHPC meets monthly at the City-County Building to review Certificate of Appropriateness (COA) applications for properties located in our four historic districts (Mansion Row, Downtown, East Spring Street and Cedar Bough Place). In addition to our administrative functions, we also work to actively promote preservation and revitalization-related activities throughout the City.

The purpose of this letter is to express the strong support of the (NAHPC) for the rehabilitation project at 921 E. 11<sup>th</sup> Street and proposed marketing effort for 1746 Ekin Avenue being led by Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana (HLFI).

Mr. Ted Fulmore, Chairperson for NAHPC and member of the Unsafe Building Committee, has informed the NAHPC of the progress that HLFi representatives Greg Sekula and Judy Martin have made with regard to the properties mentioned above.

HLFI has a proven track record of preservation and rehabilitation in New Albany. Examples of past and current projects they have led and provided guidance for include 1605 E. Spring Street, the Cardinal Ritter Birthplace and Division Street School.

We strongly encourage the preservation and rehabilitation of existing housing stock in New Albany. Demolition is permanent and irreversible and resulting gaps in the streetscape can even have a negative impact on neighborhoods that may already be struggling. Given the reported structural soundness of the structures and willingness of the current owners to work with and get assistance from HLFi we ask that the Building Commission remove the buildings from the current demolition list.
